Our dedicated team of 5 part-time staff and 115+ volunteers provide a range of services/activities to approx. 6,000 people with hearing loss, and their family and friends. These include 43 community-based NHS hearing aid maintenance 'Hearing Help' sessions across the county, and NHS hearing aid maintenance home/residential home visits. This work is a lifeline for those who face barriers to accessing mainstream audiology services for routine NHS hearing aid maintenance because they are older, frail, and have other disabilities or live in rural areas. We also provide information/advice about hearing loss, awareness-raising talks/stalls, peer support and lip-reading classes.

Lip Reading Classes in Cambridge

It is usually thought that lip-reading is so difficult to learn that there is no point in even thinking about it. This means that lip-reading skills are usually only considered necessary for the profoundly deaf, rather than for the “hard of hearing”. Of course, the evidence is that lots of people, even with hearing-aids, actually do enjoy learning lip-reading and benefit immensely from it. There are even many, who use lip-reading every day without realising it. Quite strikingly there is an increasing need for lip-reading classes. This arises, because even those with hearing-aids, do have problems hearing, especially against background noise. This often happens, for example, if you’re working in an open-plan office or a noisy work-shop or talking with softly spoken people. Also, many social gatherings are noisy, so again hearing is then difficult. In particular, holding a conversation can be impossible in a restaurant with music or other background noise. If you have encountered these sorts of problems, you would be well advised to learn some lip-reading. Certainly, it can be extremely useful in getting you to understand speech in noisy and other difficult situations. In fact, learning to lip-read is fun. Another thing is certain: if your hearing is getting worse, it is better to start lip-reading sooner rather than later; this applies whether or not you use hearing aids.

Where then, can you learn lip-reading in Cambridge now that it is no longer taught in the Audiology Department at Addenbrooke’s due to financial cuts? There are two different places at the present time. During working hours, classes are offered termly by Cambridgeshire Hearing Help on Thursdays 1.30pm to 3.30pm at St. Andrews Street Baptist Church, Cambridge, CB2 3AR. The next term commences on 26th April 2018. Places can be booked by contacting ☎ 01223 416141 or by email: enquiries@cambridgeshirehearinghelp.org.uk. These classes were started in 2017 and are free. They are taught by a fully qualified lip-reading teacher, covering the standard course. Booking is required, but you can join these classes at any time during the term.

Also, Cambridgeshire County Council has a long history of providing and running lip-reading classes on Wednesday evenings from 6.45pm to 8.45 p.m., so working people can attend. The programme involves 30 evenings per year during the 3 school terms at Mayfield School, Warwick Road, Cambridge, CB4 3NH. Each term involves 10 evenings, with a break at half term. Car parking is free and plentiful. Enquiries can be made to Astrid Whiskin ☎ 01223 703530 or by e-mail: astrid.whiskin@cambridgeshire.gov.uk. There is a very modest subscription. The next term begins on 25th April 2018. The group is an informal one of lip-readers of all ages, most of them using hearing aids. These classes not only teach how to lip-read, but also cover various techniques to help with all the problems of being hard of hearing. Light-hearted and varied exercises are used. Some people attend these evenings simply to maintain their skills at lip-reading; others are complete beginners. An important feature is the coffee/tea break, when the group socialises for 15 - 20 minutes and often compares notes about living with hearing loss. The sessions are run by a fully qualified teacher, who is helped by experienced members of the group to provide variety, as well as other lips to read.

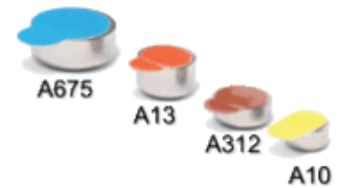

Living well with Hearing Loss - Frances' Blog *Are Rechargeable Batteries on the Horizon?*

It would be great to live without the hearing aid batteries in my bag. And there is the waste to consider - all those batteries being made and then disposed of, hopefully to be recycled, but still using up energy and resources. But is the rechargeable battery a realistic option for the future?



The technology for rechargeable hearing aid batteries already exists. The first went on the market nearly 20 years ago in 1999. Rather like the new electric cars there were drawbacks; they needed recharging for 6 hours, more frequently than once a day, which made them impractical. The batteries had a limited number of times they could be recharged before needing to be replaced by the audiologist, so this added to the cost of the service.

Recently however a new type of battery has been developed, lithium-ion (Li-on), which has a much quicker charging time of 30 minutes for 7 hours of use and has a life expectancy of 4 years. It is also easier to charge than the older version. This brings the rechargeable battery much closer to an everyday reality for hearing aid users whether private or in the NHS.

There are drawbacks to the rechargeable battery system. Even though the Li-on is a great improvement on earlier versions, most regular hearing aid users wear their aids for longer than 7 hours a day and ½ an hour is still a long time to wait to hear again. It could be very inconvenient to recharge if you were in the middle of a social event, whereas it is quick to replace a battery. The hearing aid user would be using their own electricity supply, which it might be cheaper for private aid users, who currently have to purchase their own batteries, but it would add a cost for NHS users. Even if small, this might deter some from using the aids as frequently as desirable. Remembering to put the aids to recharge might be challenging for people with memory problems.

But clearly rechargeable batteries will have great advantages, not least that the ritual of putting in the fiddly little things will be at an end. This is the technology of the future but when that might be isn't yet clear.
